
Lowest infant mortality rate in 25 years

Cradle Cincinnati + other community partners

Fueled through long-term support by the bi3 Fund

Infant mortality rate of **5.5** recorded in 2023

- The first time Hamilton County's infant mortality rate is on par with the national average (5.5), an aspirational goal set in 2013.
- The Black infant mortality rate fell into the single digits (9.0) for the first time on record

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Supporting policy change

Fueled by a \$1.2M grant to Groundwork Ohio in 2021

Policy wins for moms & babies

- Medicaid reimbursement for doula services
- **Continuous Medicaid coverage** for infants and toddlers
- The enactment of comprehensive maternal and young child health legislation (HB7)



Expanding doula services

Fueled by \$600K in grants to 3 organizations since 2023

80 doulas trained & supported

- Expanding the doula workforce to serve more families
- Building the capacity of local doula organizations to prepare for Medicaid reimbursement
- **Connecting local leaders** to state decision makers to aid in implementation

Why a doula?

Research has shown that partnering with a doula can lead to better birth outcomes for mothers, particularly those who experience health disparities.




Launching Mama Certified

Fueled by a \$580,000 grant in 2022

4 hospital systems committed	
6 birthing hospitals earning certification	

Bethesda North & Good Samaritan:





A first-of-its-kind certification that brings together all birthing hospitals in Hamilton County to advance maternal health equity for Black families.

Developed in partnership with Cradle Cincinnati, The Health Collaborative, Queens Village, and local Black Mothers—and funded by bi3—Mama Certified gives Black parents-to-be insights into maternal and infant care.

Integrating mental health in primary care settings

TriHealth Behavioral Health Integration

Fueled by a \$9 million grant in 2022

7,400 patients received services from a Behavioral Health Consultant

- **100% of adult (35) and pediatric (11) practices** have access to mental health resources
- Outpatient clinics opened in Clifton and Bridgetown
- Building community partnerships to streamline care
